Ku-ring-gai Council Community Engagement Strategy

Facilitated discussion by Will Adames – how to best engage with our Culturally and Linguistically Diverse communities – see attached.

Feedback included:

- 1. *Education* Many migrants do not understand the Australian system of government or appreciate the role that Council plays in the wider system. Council could provide some education to the Culturally and Linguistically Diverse (CALD) community regarding the functions, reach and limitations of local government.
- 2. Cultural representation within local governance people respond when they see themselves represented in government and when their voices are heard. Education could be provided to the CALD community and recent arrivals from overseas on the functions of Council, community engagement opportunities, standing for local government, opportunities for employment at Council etc., thereby providing the motivation to become more involved in the local community.
- 3. Heritage making Public recognition and promotion of the positive impact our CALD communities are having on the cultural heritage of Ku-ring-gai, and recognition of the strengths of our diverse community and the changing nature of our cultural discourse will motivate our CALD communities to engage more readily with Council.
- 4. Language More representation and promotion of our main language groups outside of English. CALD communities are more likely to engage with Council if their language and culture is represented and publicly recognised by local government.
- 5. Education regarding Australia's First Nations history and culture.

Danny Houseas shared that preliminary discussions have been held between Council and CASS regarding a pilot project focussing on providing education to the Chinese speaking community on the role and responsibilities of Council. This is a codesign process with input from participants based on understanding of local needs.

The Committee Recommends:

That point 1 to 5 above be progressed.

The Committee Recommends:

- Consider increasing advertising of cultural events street banners and bus stop advertising may be more accessible for CALD communities, many CALD groups do not know how to reach out to Council's website and therefore are not aware of events taking place.
- 2. Place stronger emphasis on food as a key component of cultural events as people enjoy eating and this may encourage people to attend who perhaps would not have attended based on the event alone.
- 3. Provision of at least two cultural events each year:

March: Persian Nowruz, Feb: Lunar New year Oct-Nov: Indian Diwali, Nov: Latin American Day of the Dead A Korean Heritage Day (to be determined)

English Language Tuition for Migrants

Discussion regarding sufficiency of English language tuition in the Ku-ring-gai area.

The Committee Recommends:

- 1. There is adequate government funding and provision of English language tuition for the majority of migrants living in Ku-ring-gai.
- 2. Gaps in service provision can be found for people on family reunion visa's, where parents (grandparents) may visit for 6 to 12 months and become isolated as they are not eligible for language tuition. There is an opportunity for Council to support functional / conversational English lessons for this group.
- 3. Promoting and supporting community based conversational English classes and social support groups in the local area.
- 4. Consider initiating local programs that address knowledge gaps and understanding of Australian culture and political systems, not adequately covered in current language tuition.
