Leading environmental stewardship while empowering our community to protect and enjoy our natural areas

Since 2005, the Environmental Levy has helped make Ku-ring-gai a leader in sustainability, resilience, and environmental conservation. Thanks to the support of our community, this investment has delivered real, measurable benefits – protecting our bushland, improving waterways, reducing energy, waste and transport emissions and strengthening our resilience to climate change.

Together, we are working towards electrifying our homes and buildings, creating a circular economy, a water-sensitive city and ensuring a thriving natural environment for future generations.



Delivering impact for Ku-ring-gai

The Environmental Levy provides essential services and environmental benefits across the community, including:

- Protecting bushland and biodiversity to enhance ecosystem resilience.
- Lowering energy use and greenhouse gas emissions to boost climate resilience.
- Reducing landfill waste and driving a circular economy with recycling and resource recovery programs.
- Reducing urban stormwater impacts and improving waterway health towards a watersensitive city.
- Minimising potable water use through innovative water conservation initiatives.
- Expanding cycleways and recreational facilities to support active and sustainable transport.
- Preventing illegal dumping and encroachment in our bushland reserves.
- Supporting local businesses and households to live and operate more sustainably.
- Fostering a deeper connection to nature and green spaces to strengthen our sense of community and wellbeing.

Best practice environmental management

The multi-disciplinary team funded by the Levy is crucial to successfully delivering these programs. These specialists ensure that:


- Environmental policies and strategies are developed and reviewed.
- Council responds effectively to federal and state environmental policy changes.
- Sustainability principles are embedded in Council's land use planning.
- Expert guidance is provided to Council and the community on environmental issues.
- Research partnerships drive innovation and knowledge-sharing.
- Environmental assessments ensure compliance and continuous improvement.

How the levy works

The Environmental Levy is set at 5% of Council's total rate revenue, with the average residential ratepayer contributing around \$80 per year.

In the 2023/24 financial year, the Levy totalled \$3.4 million, allocated across six key service themes.

Water and catchment management

Ku-ring-gai.

- 21,582 tonnes of rubbish diverted from waterways since 2012 through stormwater quality improvement devices (WSUD, GPTs, and street sweeping).
- 1,112,092 kL of water reused since 2012/13 through stormwater harvesting, leachate reuse, and sewer mining systems.
- 90% of total demand across reuse/ harvesting sites met by non-potable water in 2023/24.
- 16 creek restoration projects completed since 2005.

Energy management

- Transition to 100% renewable energy through ZEN Energy contract.
- 87% reduction in emissions from Council operations.
- 26% reduction in electricity use, saving \$516,000 annually.
- 18 electric fleet vehicles, 11 public EV charging ports, and 16 fleet EV charging ports.
- 17 solar systems and LED upgrades across multiple Council facilities.
- Major energy efficiency upgrades at Ku-ring-gai Fitness & Aquatic Centre and key Council buildings.

Community engagement

- Over 700 trees planted annually on National Tree Day with 120 volunteers.
- \$406,000 in community sustainability rebates, leading to \$431,800 in annual savings.
- \$1.1 million in grants distributed to community groups for 307 local environmental projects.
- 75,349 participants in Loving Living Ku-ring-gai programs since 2012.
- Over 2,116 residents assisted in extreme weather preparedness through Climate Wise Communities.





Biodiversity and bushland management

- Bush regeneration in 38 priority reserves, covering 342 hectares annually.
- 23 ecological burns covering 14.25 hectares to support native vegetation.
- 918 environmental volunteers contributing 7,084 hours annually.
- 881 dumping and encroachment issues resolved since 2012.

Fauna monitoring and conservation

- Monthly Grey-headed Flying Fox counts inform national conservation efforts.
- Eastern Pygmy Possum monitoring with 42 nest boxes surveyed quarterly.
- Microbat surveys across 62 sites to track species distribution.
- Large-scale fauna surveys, including Sheldon Forest and Rofe Park.



Bushfire management

• 33.4 km of major fire trails upgraded since 2012.

Sustainable transport and recreation

- Creation of Jubes Mountain Bike Park and Warrimoo Downhill Track.
- Development of 9 km of new cycleways from Roseville to St Ives.
- Maintenance and renewal of 58 km of walking tracks since 2012.
